Space Chase Summer Reading Challenge 2019

This summer all libraries in Derby are again running the Summer Reading Challenge for children aged from four to 11 years. This year's challenge starts on Saturday 13 July and is called Space Chase, inspired by the 50th anniversary of the first moon landing. It's free to join and children must be members of any library in Derby to take part. The storyline features super space family, The Rockets, on a thrilling mission to track down books stolen by mischievous aliens.

The challenge is to read six library books during the summer. Children can read any books they like – stories, fact books, picture books - it's up to them. Audio books and eBooks also count. Everyone who joins gets a free Space Chase collector card with clues to help find the aliens, uncover the missing books and complete the mission. There are six stickers to collect, one for every book children read. Some are scratch and sniff.

When children complete the challenge, they will receive a certificate and a special pair of Space Chaser glasses. There's an extra reward – the unique Space Chase wristband - for those who read a further four books.

Children under four can take part as well and will have their own collector card and stickers and the same rewards.

The challenge is supported by a programme of free events throughout the summer holidays including performance storytelling, animal handling workshops and fun interactive shows for underfives. Booking is essential for all events. Parent/ carers can book online from 13 July at www.inderby.org.uk/libraries/events or ask at their local library.

The scheme encourages children to read during the long summer break when their reading skills can decline without the regular reading activity at school. Research shows that reading for pleasure is one of the most important contributory factors in children's learning success.
