

## **World of Work Week 19<sup>th</sup> June to 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2018**

### **Context:**

In the Summer of 2017 Mickleover Primary School held their first My Money week for pupils to begin to build their understanding of financial responsibility. One of the key areas that pupils enjoyed during this theme week was finding out about careers and budgeting. This came from pupil feedback to Mrs Jones through PSHE interviews and School Council meetings.

We decided as a school for Summer 2018 to build on this in our World of Work theme week- to help pupils to learn more about careers, financial responsibility and to give them a chance to raise their aspirations as part of our work on equality, financial responsibility and also mental health and wellbeing. As part of our preparation for this work earlier this year Mrs Halliday organised for junior pupils to take part in the Drawing the Future national survey of KS2 pupils where research was undertaken nationally as part of a wider international project to see the types of jobs pupils were looking to aspire to in the future. KS1 pupils also took part in this project in school. We wanted to make sure that as part of this work pupils were made aware of gender equality in the workplace.

### **Planning and Preparation:**

A team to organise the week was made up of the following staff members:

Mrs Jones – Assistant Headteacher KS1/ PSHE Co-ordinator/ Pupil Premium.

Mrs Halliday- Assistant Headteacher KS2/ Gifted and Talented Co-ordinator




Mrs Wright- Class teacher and Enterprise Co-ordinator

Staff were given a staff meeting session on 6<sup>th</sup> June to plan their activities around the timetable organised by Mrs Jones and Mrs Halliday. Each day was to start with an assembly that was based on a specific theme.

Mrs Halliday invited parents and family members/ friends from our wider community to come in and speak to pupils about their careers. She co-ordinated the 25 volunteers from the World of Work who had offered to come to speak to the pupils, including doctors, a senior zoo keeper, website designers, a graphic designer, engineers from Rolls Royce and a reflexologist. The professional dance instructor ( Leon Heywood) also offered to lead a

dance workshop for pupils, which Mrs Halliday organised for REAL time.



Dr Nawaz came to talk to Year 1 about the importance of drinking water to look after your kidneys. He is a urological doctor.

Mrs Jones organised for the professional artist ( John Waterhouse) to speak to Year 5 and 6 pupils and to lead an art workshop for G&T/ HA pupils from Year 5 and 6 during our REAL time event.

Volunteers shared experiences from their work and talked to the pupils about the route they took into their chosen field of work.

**Mrs Wright** co-ordinated our Enterprise work for the week. All classes were invited to take part in an Enterprise challenge. Each class who participated was given a budget of £25 and asked to design and make products that they could sell to the whole school during our Enterprise sale on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> June. All the infant classes from Reception to Year 2 took part as well as 4H.

Mrs Wright and Mrs Halliday co-ordinated the sale event, with Year 2 and Year 4 pupils selling the products made by the infant classes and 4H. All pupils from across school were invited to bring in up to £1.50 to purchase items on sale, which ranged from football cupcakes, bookmarks, keyrings, glitter playdough, edible unicorn and footballer glitter and rocky road cake.



The sale was a great success and all the classes involved made back their £25 plus varying amounts of profit. The incentive for the enterprise challenge was that pupils would be able to keep any profit they made in order to purchase items for their class, e.g. new craft materials, wet play toys etc.

### **Experiences outside school:**

Mr Goodwin (catering manager) and Mrs Jones organised a visit to Bluebell Dairy to find out about milk production and designing and making ice-cream as part of our work towards the Silver Food for Life Award. The Food Council pupils all enjoyed designing and making their





own new flavour of ice-cream.

They learnt about the importance of food hygiene in food production.



The ice-cream production team sent their ice-cream taste tester to do a taste testing process with the pupils based on the ice-cream they had made and they were encouraged to ask questions about the role of the taste tester in food production at the farm.

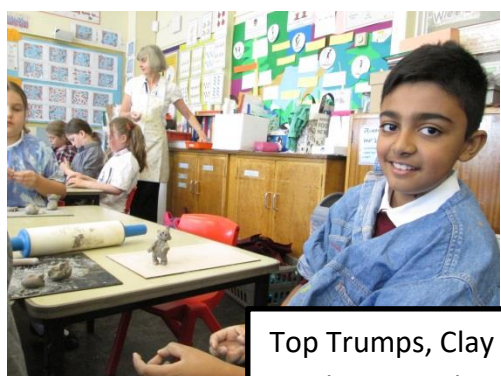
One pupil won two free entry tickets to the farm for having the winning ice-cream flavour!

### **Special visitors and our Forest of Aspirations!**

At the end of the week Mrs Jones and Mrs Halliday asked all classes to help make a Forest of Aspirations at the front of school. All pupils were given a leaf shape and their class teachers asked them to write on it their dreams for the future. The leaves were then attached to the trees at the front of school for pupils to share with their parents at the end of the school day.

We also had a visit from Derby's Youth Mayor, Frederico Almeida. He spent the afternoon with pupils and then gave a speech to the school about why he decided to run for youth mayor and what his role in the council involves. Frederico is only 16 years old ( he has just completed his GCSEs at a local secondary school in Derby) and he told the pupils about how he succeeded in gaining this position for 2018-2019 after an unsuccessful bid last year. He reminded them never to give up on your dreams, especially if you want to help others. He said that his aspirations have changed from wanting to be a bin man when he was little to now wanting to go into politics and become a member of parliament ( MP) when he is older.

We finished our theme week with a talk from our other special visitors, the Deputy Mayor and Mayoress of Derby for 2018-2019. Councillor Frank Harwood and his wife Anita. They spent time visiting classes as well and talking to pupils about their enterprise work and then Frank gave a brilliant speech about dreaming big.

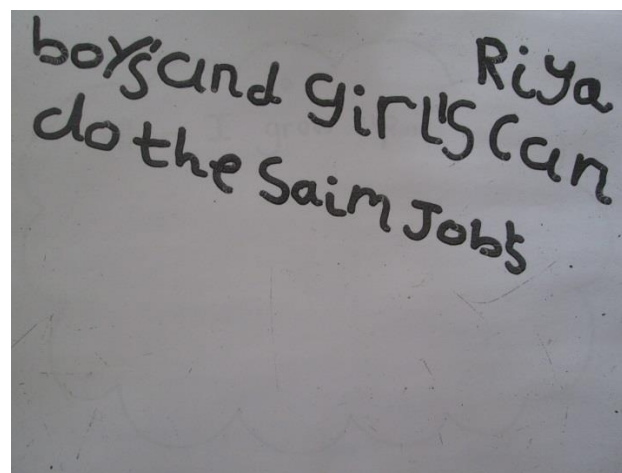
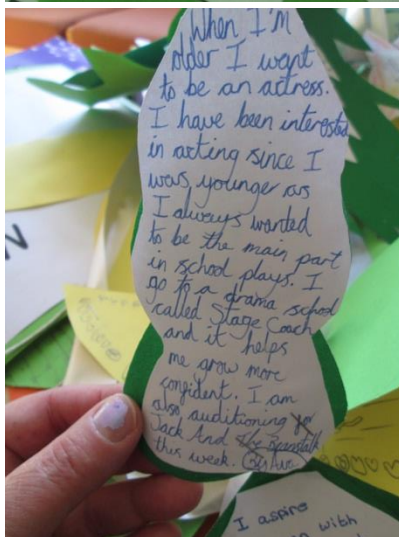
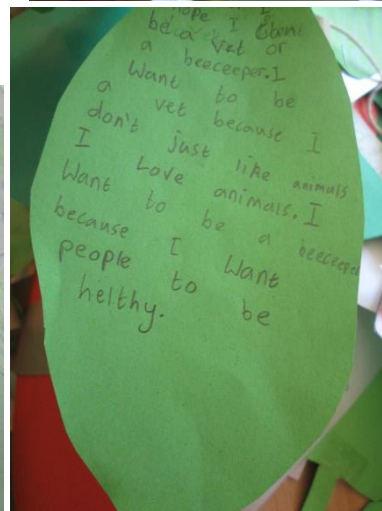
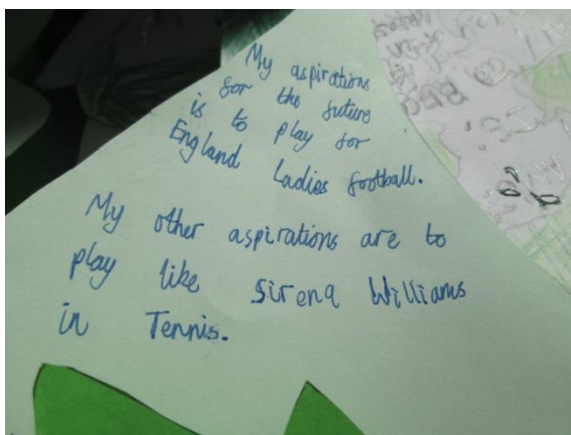
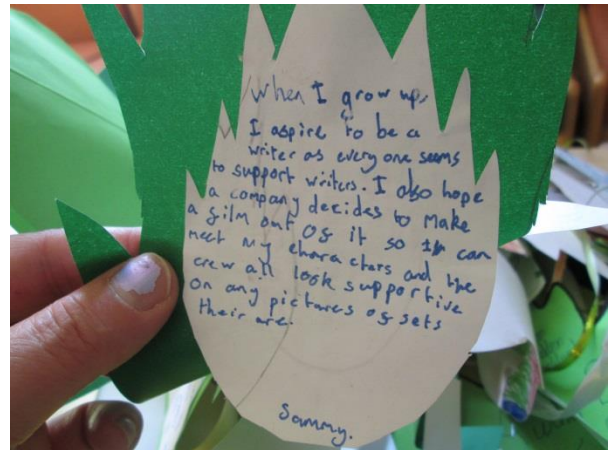
It was a wonderful end to a very exiting week at Mickleover Primary School.
