# Remembrance

## World War I Remembrance and Respect Week





#### Context:

In 2018 the nation prepared for the centenary of World War I.

Armistice Day 11<sup>th</sup> November 2018 marked the end of the four year war and the poppy, the symbol of peace and sacrifice is the symbol we all recognise as the mark of remembrance and respect.

We decided at Mickleover Primary School that as a school that we wanted to combine our antibullying work and something significant to mark the commemorations across the UK. Our 'Remembrance and Respect Week' combined the work of the Poppy Appeal from the Royal British Legion and the national anti-bullying theme of 'Choose Respect,' where pupils are encouraged to stand up against bullies, those hurting themselves or others.

#### **Planning and Preparation:**

Mrs Jones and Mrs Fox decided that this would be an important opportunity to develop a Poppy Arts Project across school in the spirit of the major art installation Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red at the Tower of London, which marked one hundred years since the first full day of Britain's involvement in the First World War. Created by artists Paul Cummins and Tom Piper, 888,246 ceramic poppies were used in the installation. Our aim was for all pupils to create a significant piece of art which could be displayed in our Remembrance Garden at the end of our theme week. We wanted to give staff and pupils the opportunity to be creative in the way they represented the poppy.

As well as a poppy project we also wanted a way as a school to record our memories and responses to the learning the pupils would be doing this week, so all classes/ year groups worked on Remembrance Books to record their poems, letters and prayers in response to the Poppy Appeal.

The week was organised as follows- with each day having a specific theme which was adapted for junior and infant pupils differently to make it more appropriate for each Key stage in school.

Each day's assembly matched with the theme of the week- we had a launch assembly on Monday from Mrs Jones ( based on Armistice Day ), on Tuesday Mrs Gerver and Mrs Hilton led members of the school choir in a fantastic reprise of some of the songs from WWI that the pupils had learnt and sung at a huge 'Lest We Forget' concert for 2000 pupils at the Genting Arena, Birmingham on the 3<sup>rd</sup> November. Pupils enjoyed listening to old favourites such as 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary' and 'Pack up your troubles.'



On Wednesday and Thursday pupils attended separate key stage assemblies to be able to explore the World War I theme at an appropriate level.



Mrs Hutchinson and the catering team completely embraced our theme week. On Tuesday we had a 'rationed' lunch of beef or veggie stew.
