Key Learning

Tudor houses were made from wood, wattle and daub.

Houses were flammable. This means they burnt easily.

Tudor houses were close together.

The fire started from 2nd September 1666 in Thomas Farriner's bakery. It lasted for 5 days. King Charles II ordered the houses to be pulled down to make a firebreak.

The dry and windy summer which made the fire spread more quickly.

Samuel Pepys wrote a diary about the events. Most houses and buildings were destroyed, including St Paul's Cathedral. The fire nearly reached The Tower of London. London was redesigned by Christopher Wren.

- King Charles II became king in 1660
- Sunday: The fire started on Pudding Lane.
 News spread and people tried to escape.
 Samuel Pepys started his diary. Houses were pulled down.
- Monday: People left on boats, carts were banned, the fire spread very close to The Tower of London.
- Tuesday: St Paul's Cathedral was destroyed.
- Wednesday: The fire burned more slowly as the wind died down.
- Thursday: The fire was finally under control.
